Class History

On September 4, 1956 twenty-six confused, clumsy, eager "giggleboxes" tumbled into Room 13 for what was afterwards known

as our Freshmen year of High School.

We started this year with none other than the honorable Mrs. Poley and Mr. Hulihan. Incidentally, they must have been forewarned (if anywarning was needed) of our mischievousness—for immediately after the second bell sounded Mr. Hulihan began his speech. We were assigned seats and since there weren't quite enough to go around three or four girls were handed over to Mrs. Poley. Next we held a class meeting and elected David Johnson as president. With the help of our advisors we formed groups and planned our first activity—a supper. After much discussion (and many arguments) we fell back on the old "stand-by"—Roast Beef. As it was, the supper could have easily been a big success, but being "greenhorns," we sort of slipped up, merely because we were afraid to ring doorbells!

During our Freshmen year we gained another classmate, Donna Phebus, bringing the total of "devilish freshmen" up to a

grand total of twenty-seven.

In September of 1957, ours was a class of eager "kids"-all ready to tell about our first "paying jobs," which many of us had during the summer. Included in this eagerness were three new faces—Margaret (Margie) Kopp, Cynthia Lukowski and James (Jay) McManus with whom we were already acquainted from grammar school. Over the summer two of our "old faces," Allen Nober and Wayne Young, had left us—leaving a total of twenty-eight to see the Sophomore year through.

In our big election of 1958 Rosa Mary Bennett was elected

president.

Another Roast Beef supper was planned, again after much discussion. This supper also met with ill-fate, for on this same night the athletic department had a track meet scheduled. Here again, our money sort of flew past us—as if given to wing. Our "main eaters" were all at the track meet, besides a great deal of our help!

Next on our schedule for that year, was a dance. We named it the "Sock Hop"-and worked hard-at the last minute. It turned out as all dances, we didn't make much, but at least we

had a good time and didn't lose anything.

Two of our classmates left us during the year-Margie Kopp and Donna Phebus; Jacoba Young left us at the end of the year

to get married.

The year 1958-59 started with much excitement, for this was a year of "many happenings." Counting noses we found twenty-six, then in January added one, Carole Stahl, making twenty-seven. Alfred Schneider was elected president at our first class meeting.

In November of 1958 we became the proud owners of shiny,

new class rings.

Looking over our treasury reports we were astonished to find we were badly in need of money for our long-awaited Washington Trip. To help fill this gap we again held a Roast Beef Supper. Our ill-fated Roast Beef Supper again met with disastrous results-this time the flu. On the day it was to be held

the school was shut down because of an epidemic of flu. Rolls, pies, salads, potatoes, vegetables and meat all had to be stored till a further date could be set. We were very sorry to inconvenience our friends, neighbors, relatives and the community this way—but as it was, that was much better than giving them the flu.

After the supper we started planning for our class play. We selected a play entitled "You'll Die Laughing" and, under the direction of Mr. Scheuran, were assigned parts and began practicing. Two weeks before the play we started to sell tickets. If we missed any doorbells, blame it on sore feet and sore thumbs.

The Junior Prom was our next aim and we had been planning for it before we got our play out of the way. We chose an oriental theme—"Cherry Blossom Time." Our Queen was Deanna Essleman and the King, Jimmy Meyer.

We had a nice turnout, and from all reports heard, adults

as well as students had a wonderful time.

Our senior year started with even more enthusiam. Our Washington Trip was finally coming and not too far in the fubure!

On October 21, 1959 at 8:55 a.m. we gathered in Room 18 to discuss our trip with Mr. Hulihan, Mrs. Poley and Mr. Sullivan.

On November 28, 1959 a bunch of twenty-five excited, half-asleep seniors gathered at 5:30 to start for Washington.

Robert Rasmussen was elected president of the senior class, which had now dwindled to twenty-five with the loss of Jay McManus during the summer.

Dena Kennedy was elected editor of the yearbook and "The Chieftain" of 1960 started being planned, under the direction

of Mr. Burke.

These are all memories to us now. We've had a nice "visit" at N.H.S. and only hope we've set the right kind of example for our underclassmen whom we have grown to know and love as brothers and sisters.

We are grateful to the teachers and Mr. Sullivan for guiding us through these twelve years—especially Mr. Hulihan and Mrs. Poley who helped us through the four hardest years of our lives.

We hope that they aren't anxiously awaiting the time when They will be rid of us and that if we meet them on the street and yell "Hi Mom and Pop—they won't be too embarrassed.
