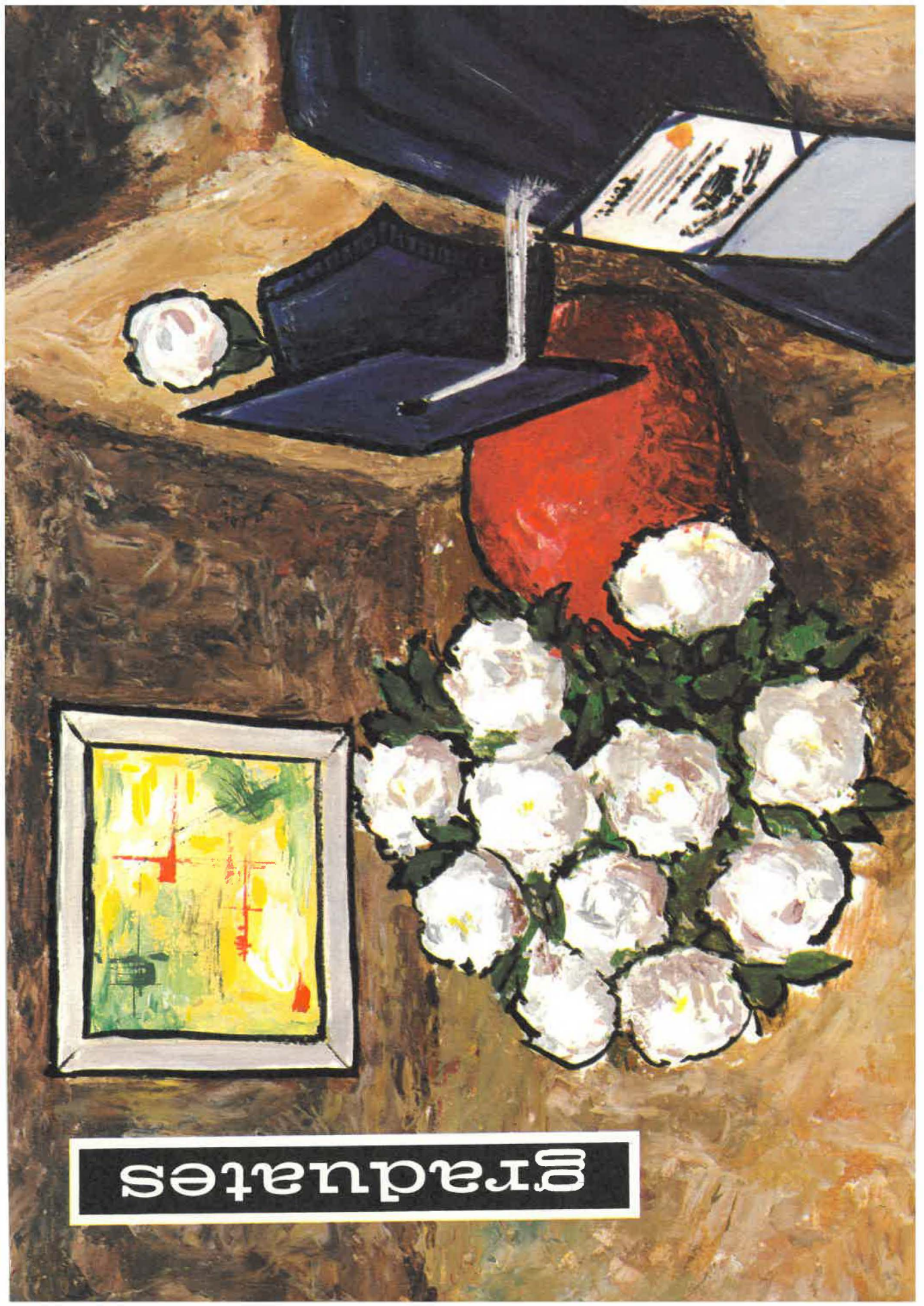
My feelings toward the class of 1961 are compounded of admiration, affection, respect, gratitude, pride, solicitude, interest, hope, and responsibility.

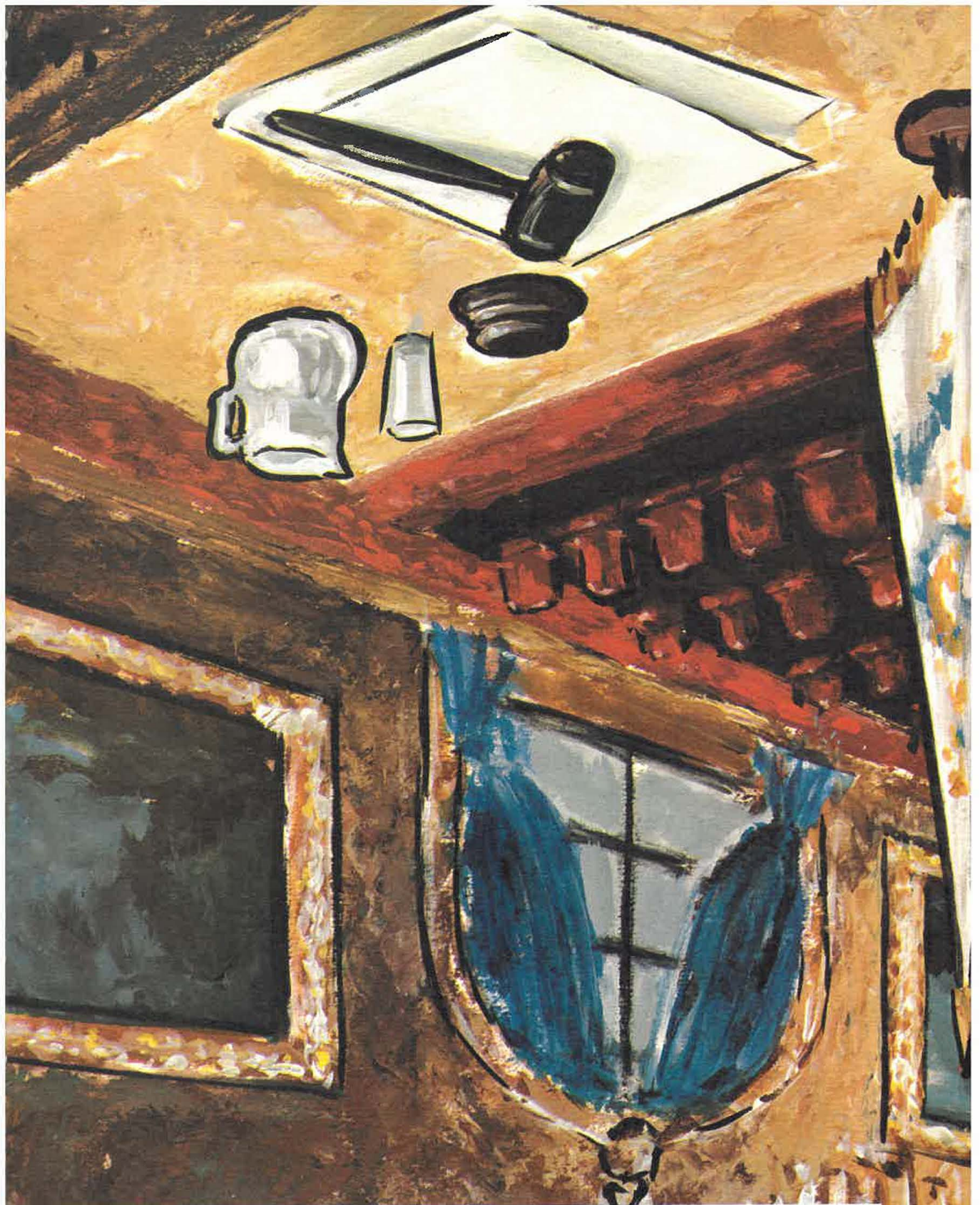

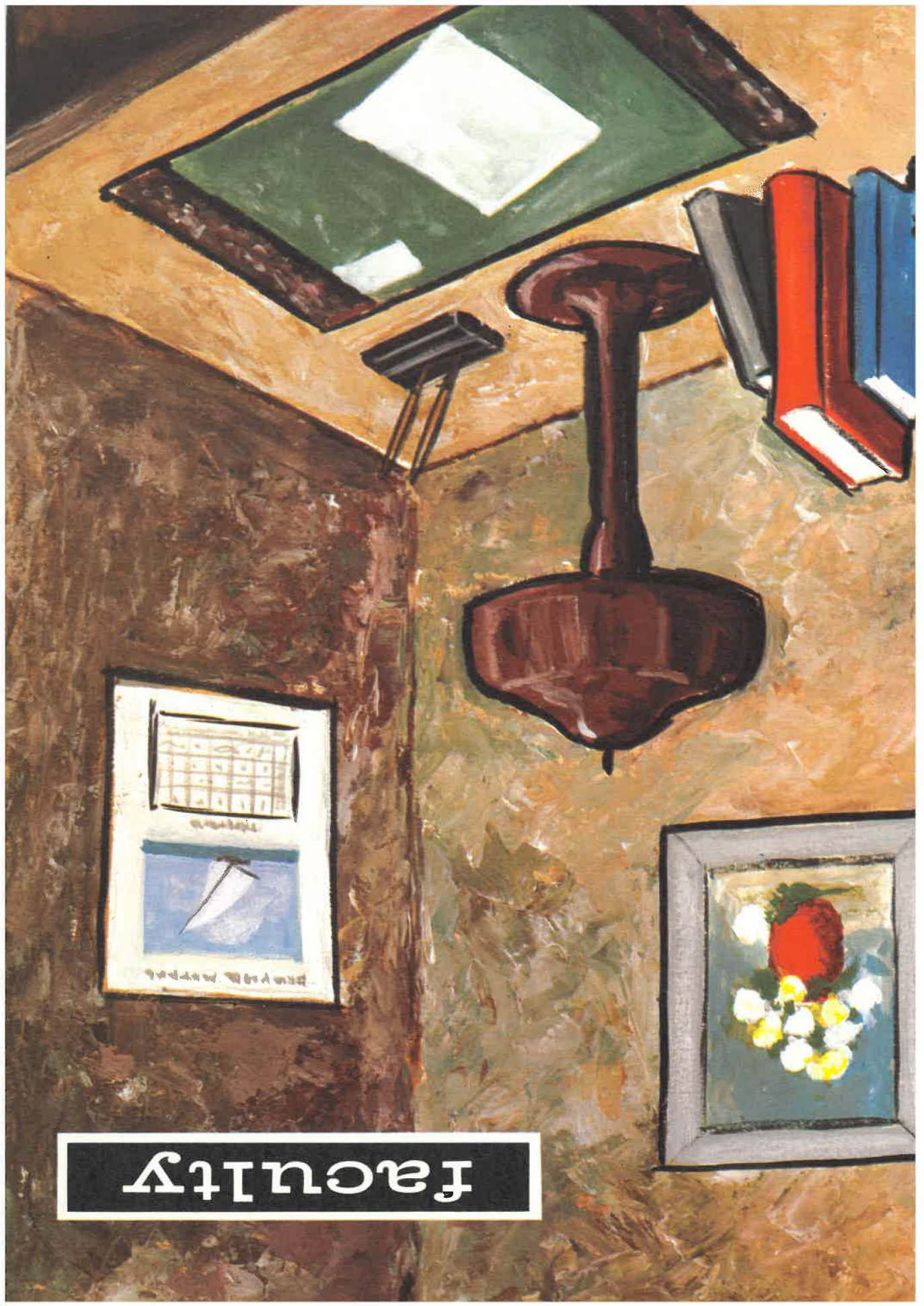

Class History

On September 4, 1957 with Mr. Martin and Miss Stegner as its advisors, the class of 1961 began its high school career.

Because of the limited space in room 16, our homeroom, three of our classmates had to be "deported" to the homemaking room under the direction of Mrs. Poley.

We began that year with two new members; Gladys Schultz and Ted Dailey. Both left us in the second semester.

Our first order of business was the election of class officers. Frank Kurzenski was elected president; Bob DePasquale, vice-president; Charles Huebner, treasurer; and Elizabeth Umnik, secretary.

We were allowed one money-raising activity for our freshman year so on March 12, 1958 we successfully put on a turkey dinner.

That year three members left us; Richard Clark in October, Alan Nober in March and Bob Cassol in June.

Our sophomore year commenced on September 3, 1958 with everyone regretting the fact that Mr. Martin was no longer our class advisor but ready to welcome Mr. Scheuren, as our new one.

In September, Bill Barnes rejoined us, along with Mary Jane Early. Late in the first semester, Ray Yakin joined us and in the beginning of the second semester Dave Danchak moved from Pennsylvania to Narrowsburg and became a member of our class.

The officers elected were as follows; president, Frank Kurzenski; vice president, Beverly Bennett; treasurer, Charles Huebner and secretary, Elizabeth Umnik.

As sophomores we were allowed two money-raising activities. On October 20, 1958 we put on our first dance---"Twilight On Alaska" so named because Alaska had just been admitted to the Union. It was a failure monetarily as are most dances. However, undaunted, on March 12, 1959, we sponsored another turkey dinner which net with considerable success.

Our junior year began on September 9, 1959. We welcomed back two former members---Mary Fulton, who had been with us since eighth grade and Ted Dailey, who had left us in the ninth grade.

Again, because of the lack of space, our class was divided and five members were sent to room 18 under the responsible guidance of Mr. Robisch.

In early fall we ordered our class rings and before Christmas, we were proudly wearing them.

Our elected officers for that year were: president, Frank Kurzenski; vice-president, Bob DePasquale, secretary, Beverly Bennett and treasurer, Douglas Mohrmann.

Being juniors we were allowed three money-raising activities during the course of the year. Our first was a roast beef supper on March 23, 1960. The second was our junior play, *Stalin Allee*, on April 8, 1960. On May 27 we put on the junior prom entitled "Chez Paree" with the theme being, of course, Paris.

At the close of our junior year we lost five members: Mary Jane Earley, Joyce Roberts, Patricia Luning, Mary Fulton and Marion Tyler.

Thus ended our junior year in high school.

On September 7, 1960, with only twenty-three members, we began our long awaited senior year.

As usual our first job was to elect our class officers. They were: president, Frank Kurzenski; vice-president, Dave Danchak; treasurer, Charles Huebner and secretary, Carren Orsini.

Because of a shortage of funds for the Washington trip, our class put on a spaghetti supper on October 5, 1960. This activity was a dismal failure because several other organizations had activities scheduled for that same evening.

At 5:30 A.M. on October 27, our class, bleary-eyed and groggy assembled in the downstairs main hall of the school for the necessary safety checks to be made prior to boarding the Washington, D.C. bound bus.

After four days of sight-seeing and trouble making we returned to Narrowsburg, weary but happy.

With a feeling of deep appreciation, we would like to thank the faculty and Mr. Sullivan for the invaluable guidance they have given us, and especially Mssrs. Martin and Scheuren, who have helped us through, perhaps, the most difficult years of our lives.

- Mary - Wills her cheer-leading uniform to her sister, Fran.



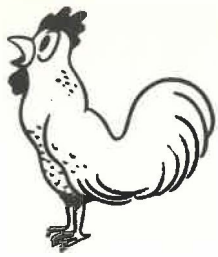

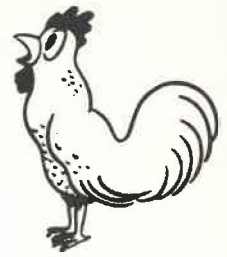

Nor will anyone say that the evenings were wasted for it was then that the Lincoln and Jefferson Memorials---two places which can never be appreciated until the night forms a backdrop for the stark whiteness of these shrines---were seen.

Suddenly, and all too soon, it was time to pack and leave for home. However, even in the few remaining moments before boarding the bus, one final tour was taken to Ford's Theatre.

As the seniors once more boarded the bus, it was noted that now there was an extra passenger---a chubby, blond puppy which was given to Mr. Scheuren. Little D.C.---rather appropriately named---was enjoyable company on the trip home and is probably one of the best-traveled pups in town.

The long journey home seemed a bit shorter than the one going down although a stop was made for a complete tour of the famous battlefield at Gettysburg.

Then finally, the bus made its last stop---at historic Narrowsburg, home of Fort Delaware, Narrowsburg High School, twenty three tired seniors, their advisors and one sleepy puppy.
